Last year we planted a large area of daffodils by the Lower Shott car park and this year we will be doing the same along the cherry tree avenue by the Lower Road recreation ground.

On Fridays you can order a Christmas Cake or mince pies from our home cooks to be collected later, and we have artisan breads without any chemicals. There are homemade preserves of all kinds and local honey, great stocking fillers, as well as some wonderful plants, propagated by our expert suppliers.

Having done your shopping, relax and enjoy a freshly brewed Fairtrade coffee or Teapigs tea, or maybe a warming mug of hot chocolate, with a slice of home-made cake.

The market is run completely by volunteers

and is a valuable community activity providing a venue for social interaction, income for the BCA to help the upkeep of the Old Barn Hall and a source of high quality, locally produced products for its customers.

They are friendly, supportive and informative and show you how to use your visual sense to bolster your residual hearing. As well as lipreading they cover many useful topics including assistive devices, understanding hearing loss and strategies to get help from friends and family. Many participants find it a relief and a pleasure to meet others to share their experiences and this can help reduce feelings of isolation. The Meeting Place subsidises the cost of these classes.

Our Hearing Champions service offers free support on the operation and basic maintenance of NHS hearing aids (including battery supply,

cleaning and re-tubing and trouble shooting). In addition, information, advice and signposting to other services and equipment is available. Hearing Champions takes place on selected Saturday mornings throughout the year in association with the Meeting Place Coffee Shop held at Bookham Baptist Church Hall. The next sessions is on 6 December, 10am to 12 noon. This is a drop-in service, no appointment necessary, refreshments are available. Please bring your brown NHS battery book.

As we get closer to Christmas, all are welcome at the Anna Chaplaincy's Advent Carol Service on Wednesday 3 December at Eastwick Road Church. This short service with mince pies and coffee available beforehand will be especially suitable for those on a dementia journey and their families and carers.

Owls, hooting and a hunting

As the nights draw in, Tawny Owls call out to claim their patch. Around now, younger owls are noisily making themselves known, hoping to muscle in and set up their own territory. But if other owls are close by, there's often a standoff in the darkness, it hoots before dawn. Listen out as the rival calls reverberate through the woodlands, mature parks and gardens throughout England, Scotland and Wales. The famous 'too-wit, too-woo' is actually a duet – the female making a 'toot-wit' (or more like a 'kerweeek') first note and the male answering with a long, drawn-out "too woooooo".

There are Short-eared Owls in the UK all year round, but now is a great time to see them as more join us from Scandinavia, Russia and Iceland to escape the freezing conditions further north.

In winter the best places to spot them are during the day at our wetlands and coastal marshes, flying low over the landscape on the hunt for rodents. You often see more than one owl surveying the same area, slowly and silently scanning the long grass or marsh, ready to swoop down at deadly speed to catch their supper.



Target Shooting's Ryder Cup: Our members help Britain defend the Roberts Trophy

Team GB has won the 2025 Field Marshal Earl Lord Roberts Trophy at Bisley, defeating Team USA 3863-3821 in what's been called smallbore rifle's answer to golf's Ryder Cup. (Although Team GB shooters won much more emphatically than the European golfers!)

Like the Ryder Cup, this transatlantic rivalry is steeped in pageantry and national pride. Every four years, the world's best American and British shooters face off in an intimate, high-stakes team competition—alternating between the Pershing Trophy when held in the U.S. and the Roberts Trophy in Britain.

The Drama at Bisley

American Sarah Beard dominated with a tournament-high 396, including a remarkable 199 at 50 meters—two points clear of any competitor. But Britain's depth proved decisive. Led by Adam Fowler (391) and backed by Robert Dowling and Lina Jones (both 390), Team GB built a crucial 10-point advantage at 50 meters that Team USA couldn't overcome. Both Lina and Adam are regular shooters at

Bookham Rifle club, Lina also provides top coaching tips to our newest members! It's amazing to have such prestigious sports people in our local club!




The Arts Society Bookham

New Youth & Community Centre – Good news!



Budget secured & planning in progress

David Cox OBE, Chair of Trustees, Bookham Youth & Community Association (BYCA)

Background

In 2012, BYCA initiated an outline agreement with SCC for a new replacement Youth & Community Centre. The old Centre closed in 2019 without the agreement being finalised. BYCA continued to push for a replacement Centre and in 2021 SCC agreed a budget of £2.5m to build one at the Lower Road Recreation Ground (LRRG), our preferred location. The old site would then be available for housing or other use.

Despite MVDC Planning recommending refusal (due to green belt), outline planning permission was granted in May 2021. Issues within the local authorities delayed progress

and the planning permission expired in May 2024. A new application was submitted in April 2025, but was refused by SCC Planning, citing green belt and bio diversity issues.

New centre planned for old site (opposite Anchor Pub) – Budget of £2.8m secured

Planning's refusal of the preferred LRRG site was disappointing. However, the old site at 164, Lower Rd was our "Plan B".

Stakeholders immediately engaged with our County Councillor, Cabinet Member, and SCC's Leader to take Plan B forward, and a budget of £2.8m to build a new Centre at 164 Lower Road was formally approval by SCC's Cabinet on 23rdSeptember 2025.

Extracts from SCC's press release:

"Surrey County Council's Cabinet has given the green light to build a brand-new Bookham Community Centre, marking a significant milestone for residents and local community groups.

The former Bookham Youth and Community Centre, located at 164 Lower Road, served the community from the 1950s until its closure in 2019.....After careful consideration of potential sites and planning constraints, Cabinet has now confirmed that the new Bookham Community Centre will be delivered independently of any housing development, ensuring that the needs of the community remain the top priority.

The current building on Lower Road, will be demolished and replaced with a modern structure designed with Surrey County Council's net zero aspirations in mind. The building will have energy-efficient systems and renewable energy sources such as solar panels and heat pumps.

The new centre will provide a flexible, multifunctional space for a wide range of local activities, supporting the creation of a vibrant, inclusive community hub. SCC aims to complete the project by March 2027.

Progress & communications

More planning and other approvals will be needed but discussions and meetings with SCC Officers are continuing. BYCA is investing in a new website to inform the community on progress and matters relating to the new Centre.

BYCA comment

We thank SCC's Cabinet for its support. Particularly County Councillor Curran and the Leader of SCC, Cllr Oliver, who have both been very supportive over the years, and instrumental in overcoming obstacles and getting this project funded.

The drive is now to get the Centre built as soon as possible. Let's hope we have no more "false dawns"!







Two Club members played a big part in the organisation of the NAFAS Floral Design Show at the RHS Wisley Garden Flower Show in September.



FaB Repair Café

Since our inception in January 2024 the FaB Repair Café has successfully repaired more than 1,000 items for the local community.

In addition to our regular monthly Café events, we hosted several 'pop-up' events this year. Notably, in June, we participated at Bookham Village Day with a teddy bear repair stall in support of the Teddy Bears' Picnic theme, and in September, the National Trust invited us to provide services at their Heritage weekend at Polesden Lacey.

The FaB Repair Café, which serves Fetcham, Bookham, and nearby areas, was established by members of Bookham and Horsley Rotary Club, St. Mary's Church, Fetcham, and a dedicated team of skilled local volunteers. The initiative promotes sustainable living and environmental stewardship by repairing items and reducing landfill waste.

Our volunteers offer expertise in repairing a diverse range of items, including:

- · Clothing and textiles
- Electrical appliances
- · Mechanical devices
- Jewellery

- · Wooden objects
- · Garden tool sharpening

For those who have not yet visited us, our sessions take place in the church hall at St. Mary's, Fetcham (off The Ridgeway), on the first Saturday of every month. Visitors are welcome to bring broken possessions for assessment and repair by our volunteer specialists.

They are encouraged to remain with the repairer to observe the work and potentially acquire useful skills for future repairs. Please note, we request only one item per visit. Alternatively visitors may join us for coffee and cake and learn more about our activities.
