My cup runneth over...well, my pond actually.

At long last, the Isle of Wight Pond has refilled - the winter rains (so vital in avoiding droughts in the summer) suddenly topping-up the pond in a matter of days. Thanks to the Bookham Commons Conservation Volunteers, the sluice boards have been replaced and gaps plugged with sticky clay.

The commons are back to their rather squelchy winter wetness - not everyone's favourite for walking, but part of their character and beneficial for wildlife. One of the factors that saved this old swamp (apart from the wonderful support and far-sighted appreciation of its value for recreation by the locals), was the lack of drainage, and being too wet for farming. So, if you'll forgive my expression, there's a lot of mud and we're stuck with it!

One of the past year's highlights was the progress made on our Friends of Bookham Commons' "Edge Project", where in the dry autumn, we were able to do so much clearing along the woodland margins to encourage the return of the nightingales. Many other forms of wildlife, including wild flowers, insects, and many other bird species will benefit from this habitat management. The success of the operation means that this year we'll be able to finish-off with less disturbance, and a bit of "fine-tuning" from our volunteers to get these areas just right. Hopefully, our visitors will also appreciate the interesting wildlife in an attractive, varied landscape.

In the grazed areas, Belted Galloway cattle have been browsing the young trees and scrub, slowing down the rate of successional change. Beyond the fence, our other browsing animals (yes, the conservation volunteers!) have been very busy "browsing" with bow saws and loppers – and we just couldn't manage without them. A great big thank-you to all of them, and to you, for your support.

Chairman's Report





Bookham and Fetcham Gardeners Association

Everyone likes something for nothing and as any good gardener will tell you making free garden compost is a great source of goodness for any garden or allotment. You just can't have too much of it. It not only improves the soil enormously, but it will add nutrients to feed all your plants or produce for months to come.

Here's how easy it is. You will need a bin to get the ball rolling. There are numerous types of compost bins on the market, and everyone has their favourite. Perhaps the cheapest is one made out of 4 old pallets. This type is best lined, for which we sell the perfect breathable material for such purposes in the huts. Alternatively, the cheap 'dalek' type, provided by the council is a good start. You will probably need two though, and even that may not be enough.

For the quickest and best results, start by alternating layers of dry and wet material. Good examples of dry material are shredded paper (preferably not highly coloured from a glossy magazine), leaves, torn up cardboard, wood shavings, and sawdust can all go in. Then add layer of wet - peelings, annual weeds, grass cuttings, dead flowers, horse manure (we sell composted horse manure in bags). If you have rabbits or guinea pigs, add the soiled bedding, which may be classified as wet or dry. Just keep adding.

A bin started at the beginning of spring will yield some lovely compost the following autumn. Anything that has not rotted by the autumn (usually the top six inches or so), goes back in at the bottom for next time. Some bins are faster than others, but they all work better in the sun providing they are not left to dry out. Some people stir or turn them, others just leave them to get on with it. The secret is getting the mix of layers right, and from that the level of moisture in the heap should also be just right. It's simply this,

as long as the layers are right you just can't fail.

You can use a compost accelerator, which may slightly speed up the process, and we are happy to sell you some of that too - but, to be honest, if you get the balance right you won't need any additives. In the autumn and winter, mulch with it or just dig it in, put thick layers everywhere. So that's our best tip for all gardeners this spring.

Of course, we sell several types and makes of potting compost for seed sowing, etc., but ordinary garden compost is there for all and you can make loads for free. Whatever your other basic gardening needs, you will probably find we sell that too and at very competitive prices. It costs just £3 a year to join the Association, so come along to the Allotment Huts at the bottom of Keswick Road any Sunday morning. Our shop is open 10:00 am till Noon every Sunday, so do have a look round. We are open to all.

We are an independent Children's Centre based out of Bookham Baptist Church in the heart of the village. We have lots going on for parents, grandparents, and carers so do check out our Facebook page at 'Bookham Baptist Children's Centre'.

Our baby and toddler group, Noah's Ark, runs on Thursdays from 1:30 pm - 3:00 pm during term time, and RhymeTime on Friday mornings for babies and toddlers. This session is run in partnership with The Meeting Place Cafe, which is open here on Mondays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 10:00 am - 12:00 pm. You don't need to book for any of these sessions,

simply pop along for a cuppa and you are sure to find a warm welcome. We also have links to a range of other services, such as The Citizens Advice Bureau, Free Legal Advice drop in sessions, CAP free Debt Help charity, and Foodbank vouchers available.

We also work very closely with Rainbow Playgroup which runs here on weekdays from 8:45 am - 12:45 pm for 2-5 year olds.

We have a number of regular courses including the 'Talking Teens' Parenting Course, and Paediatric First Aid course for Parents and Grandparents - so do get in touch to find out more. In addition to our centre based sessions,

we also have a new family support outreach service, for those who may need a little additional support, for example, if you have postnatal depression or anxiety, are struggling with your child's behaviour, are a lone parent, or have a child with additional needs. Bookham Youth & Community Centre

The Bookhams Youth Project (BYP) continues to flourish. The Monday and Friday sessions are well attended by a mix of young people. Other Youth organisations continue to use the large amount of space that is available, together with the much improved supplementary facilities. This allows the groups using the facility a large degree of flexibility in activities in a spacious environment. It is also used by other youth and young adult groups, such as Disability Challengers, Barnardos and St Nicolas Church. All these run Clubs in the evenings, and Disability Challengers use the Centre during the holidays. Other groups use the facilities on an ad hoc basis.

A dialogue continues to be held with Surrey County Council to replace the existing building, which has a limited life span. However, a new community facility would take the centre beyond the current lease, which expires in 2019. A request to extend the lease for a further period has been sent to SCC which has the support of our County Councillor, Clare Curran. SCC have promised to out forward some outline proposals in the first quarter of 2018. The main rooms of the Centre were all painted over Christmas.

During Term time Smarty Pants Preschool use the Centre. The Action Arts Theatre, run by Elizabeth Crawford, provides performing arts activities after school on Wednesdays from 4:15 pm. This



Bus Stop Pre-School



The children have enjoyed their winter term at Bus Stop, and been kept very busy, as always! To celebrate Halloween, one of the rooms at Bus Stop was turned into spooky potion house, dripping with cobwebs, hairy spiders, bats, rats, potion mixing bowls, and magical spells. It was a great opportunity to read Julia Donaldson's "Room on the Broom", collect hazel 'whips' (skinny sticks) for making magic wands and thicker lengths of hazel to make broomsticks, and to do some pumpkin carving – the pumpkin seeds have been saved and dried and will hopefully provide next year's crop!



Following on from Halloween, the crafts and activities focused on fireworks! This is one of the favourite themes at Bus Stop as it supports all of the areas of development, particularly children's literacy and physical skills as they make big arm and big body movements, use describing words and moving within the space around them.

The children have also enjoyed listening to "Frances the Firefly". This story supports the children's understanding of keeping safe around fires, matches, and lighters. The story encourages the children to tell a grown-up if they find a match or lighter, and indoctrinates that only grown-ups should use matches/lighters. It's a very effective story, and all the children have shown great awareness, recalling how we keep safe around our fires at pre-school.

Another November activity was making wooden Menorah (candelabra), these are lit to remember the eight days of Hanukkah. To make the Menorah, the children used four tools: the bow-saw to saw the hazel to the correct length; a bill hook and mallet to split the hazel in half making the Menorah base; and a palm drill to drill the holes for the candles.

The children have also had great fun learning how to play the Hanukkah game, Dreidel. This game supports the children's mathematical development for counting, understanding halves, simple fractions, and using mathematical language, such as 'more' and



'none'. The game develops turn-taking skills and an understanding of winning and losing.

In December, the children visited the Polesden Lacey House all dressed ready for Christmas. The last day of term, parents, grandparents, and carers were invited to the annual Christmas song time! It was lovely to watch the children in the Nativity and to listen to all the songs they had been practising at pre-school and home!

The theme for the spring term is 'Nursery Rhymes' and so will be creating an array of crafts and participating in activities that tie in with these!

Bookham Rifle Club

Bookham Rifle Club, nestled in the old orchard gardens of Thorncroft Manor, just south of Leatherhead, provides the local community access to a unique sport. Our members shoot on all levels in county and national competitions at our lovely large clubhouse facility, and is open to all ages from 8 to 80, men, women, and people with wide ranging disabilities. David Sprigg accepted, on behalf of BRC, the Mole Valley Sports "Disability Sports Award Winner". Peter Vigar and Nikki Campana also worked with Dyscover group (supporting people with Aphasia) to shoot air rifle, significantly changing people's outlook on their abilities. It's both an individual and team sport which does not require a high level of physical strength - Bench Rest is as challenging as standing, or a prone position. Test yourself across different disciplines, including Long rifle (basically using live .22 ammunition) or lightweight sporting rifle, (standing) on ranges from 25 yards, 50 yards, and 100 yards. Our amazing indoor facilities for air rifle and pistol is definitely worth trying out - not to mention, an archery range too! All equipment and

instruction is provided by the club.

Shooting is for everyone, and that is why the club itself is a diverse and friendly group of people. Throughout the year, we have Open Days to try-out the sport. You can apply for membership at any time, beginning as a probationer while receiving excellent training and coaching. The Target Shooting School also uses our ranges and provides top-class coaching. Coach Mick Gault, famous as the alltime highest medal-winning pistol champion, visits regularly to coach our newest members, as well as the National standard shooters. You can become very good very quickly at shooting, and a majority of our members compete in local leagues and club cup competitions. Our best shots are regularly winning top national honours, and we are very proud that club member Lina Jones has been chosen to shoot for Great Britain in the Commonwealth Games in Australia this April.

Shooting at the National Championships in August at Bisley, both Bookham Club and Surrey County teams (Lina, Simon Aldhouse, Tim Hammond, Dave Crispin, Peter Jones, and John Belringer) all did amazingly well, 1st in 50m and 100 yards and coming 2nd at the Queen Alexandra Cup and Astor County Championship. Neale Parry shot brilliantly in the "Bobs" final (2nd) and Welsh prone (2nd). Both Lina and Simon shot for GB vs USA team in the Earl Roberts, narrowly beaten by just 11 shots.

Lina did win for England in the Home Countries match though – being awarded the Wilkinson Sword Trophy.

For Air sports, in the British Schools Pistol Championships, notably Toby Meek and James Miller won silver and gold medals at the South East regional competitions, with Luke Read and Martha Hansford getting through to the finals at the senior level. Among our junior members, it is more than likely we will find future British champions!

With such a wonderful shooting facility right here in the Bookham area, why not encourage your children to become athletes in this challenging and elite sport?


Our walking groups are continuing with their weekly and monthly walks in the local area,

Through of all this, the herons were regularly to be seen together with ducks, red kites, moorhens, coots, swans etc. Thankfully, Bookham Commons are still very much frequented by a wide variety of wildlife, including deer and smaller mammals.

Meanwhile, the 'Life on the Edge' project has had another good season thanks to the good work of A&K Elms. It may be recalled that the objective behind this project is to clear overgrown scrub from the Commons to produce grassy areas next to the remaining scrub. This will provide food (insects and grubs) to encourage nesting bird life to prosper with hopefully the return of the

nightingales and cuckoos. The final work of the three-year project is planned for the end of the 2018 season. We have now reached our target of £12,000 and soon will be able to take on other projects.

Our membership is still slowly rising, now topping 200. Members of the Committee will again stage a presence in the Tunnel car park, on Good Friday 30th March 2018 to answer any questions you may have.

Christmas Charity Post

This year sales of stamps and numbers of cards delivered were much like last year, halting the declines of the last few years. Once again, my thanks goes to all concerned with the Christmas Charity Post [CCP], from the Committee, to the stamp sellers, both door to door and those in local shops, the leafleters, sorters and deliverers who turned out in all weathers during late November and December to get the cards to the door.

I would especially like to thank all the twelve shops that again sold stamps this year and acted as posting points. The total stamp sales at shops increased this year from £2,374 in 2016, to £2,469 - constituting 68% of total stamp sales of £3,612. Special thanks must again go to Wishing Well and Brackenburys in Bookham, who sold £840 and £576 worth of

stamps respectively, and Contact in Fetcham who sold £369. Open All Hours in Fetcham raised £137, Sibleys raised £117, and Parkers in Effingham raised £115 - all sold over £100 worth of stamps.

The Committee have agreed that this year, the £3,500 will be divided between three projects. Firstly, £1,500 will be donated to the Disasters Emergency Committee for their support of member charities providing temporary shelter, emergency healthcare, food, clean drinking water, and sanitation services to the Myanmar Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh. In addition, £1,000 will be donated to Medecins Sans Frontieres, for their work in Yemen. Finally, £1,000 will be donated to Practical Action, for water projects throughout East Africa. This amount will be matched by DFID (Department

for International Development), thus rounding it up to a grand total of £2,000.

If you are going to spend any time at the seaside, it may be a good idea to go to a beach which has RNLI Lifeguards in attendance. We now have Lifeguards on over 240 beaches, which you can find by visiting our webpage at https://rnli.org/find-my-nearest/lifeguarded-beaches.

Here in Surrey, we have more people die in water than in fires. Although we don't currently have the 2017 numbers, in 2016 alone we had 9 fatalities in water and 2 fatalities in fires. The Bookham and

Leatherhead branch of the RNLI has been working with Surrey Fire and Rescue Service to get our water safety message to as many young people as we can to try and lessen the number getting into difficulties in water.

Part of this is to tell children that they must ask 4 questions before they jump into water:

- 1. How deep is it?
- 2. What is on the bottom?
- 3. Is there a current?
- 4 Is the water cold? (A major danger is Cold Water Shock.)

Not long ago, a 10 year-old girl told me that she thought of a 5th further question - is there a way out? A great question and one very bright young lady. Bookham Stamp Club



51 members attended the September meeting to see and enjoy two displays from members', Simon McArthur and Barry Feltham. Simon presented a display on aspects of the Third Reich in the first half and Barry Feltham did a PowerPoint presentation of his Victorian Postal Stationery Postcards in the second half.

The 60 members in October were thoroughly entertained by Chris Harman FRPSL, a renowned philatelist who was elected to the roll of Distinguished Philatelists in 2003 and was President of the Royal Philatelic Society (RPSL) in 2005, along with many other distinguished posts. He is also currently Chairman of the RPSL Expert Committee, as well as being a Judge and International Large Gold Exhibitor. After such an introduction, Chris lived up to the billing with a superb display of 'Modern Postal History 1936 -Decimalisation. Chris explained that it was a display that was affordable and you just needed to know what you were looking for. In the first half we saw single and combinations of stamps from different reigns and their usages from KGV, KEVIII, KGVI to QEII. They included inland covers, Airmail letters, covers abroad, especially a cover to General Franco's wife. Chris mentioned a couple of rarities in stamp usage, the Wildings 75d black which was issued on 28th January 1974 and was only in use for 4 days before the postal rates were increased on the 2nd February.

November brought us a super display of Dominica by Simon Richards, which is one of the most complete collections of Dominica to be seen today. Simon started by giving us a history lesson of Dominica. Simon showed us a superb and comprehensive display of material form the Island starting with the first known letter to England dated 1763. We were shown scarce postmarks, packet/ship letters, essays, master proofs, die proofs and specimens.

Our Christmas meeting was a great success, with 60 members attending. The members enjoyed a free buffet lunch with wine. The festive spirit continued with a raffle, the star prize being a superb hamper. We also had some small displays on view - the local Charity Christmas Post and Christmas Mail. We rounded the day of with a successful auction.

Bookham Stamp Club, founded in 1993, meets every 4th Tuesday of the month (except for December) at the Old Barn Hall, Church Road, Great Bookham. Bookham Wine Club

Club members experienced a very different Annual General Meeting in October last year, with the launch of a new, streamlined AGM format and 'mini' wine tasting event. Not only had the official business part of the meeting been shortened (to finish in half the time), but we were also able to enjoy an entertaining and light-hearted account of a wine tasting trip in the Rhône Valley, courtesy of one of the club's members, David Mendus. Complete with photos, anecdotes, and accompanied by two lovely wines from the area (a Lirac Blanc and a red Costières de Nîmes), a convivial evening was had by all.

In November, we were delighted to welcome back Richard Bost, an experienced wine educator, and one of our regular presenters, to tell us more about some lesser known wines produced in Italy.



Members were astonished to learn that Italy is home to a tremendous 900+ indigenous grape varieties, many of which are destined only for local consumption, and the country has regularly been the World's largest wine producer since 2011. Perhaps not surprisingly, 99.6% of the wine drunk by its inhabitants is Italian and we love it here in the UK too - Pinot Grigio accounts for approximately 40% of all wine sales. One of our favourites of the evening was a white wine produced in Calabria from an ancient grape variety. This had previously been awarded Decanter silver status, and it also won our very own 'white wine of the month' vote. The winner of our 'red wine of the month', was a beautifully smooth Riserva from Puglia, the country's largest producing wine region.

An excellent evening was had by all at our recent Christmas event, expertly hosted by Heather Dougherty, wine writer, judge, and one of the Club's most popular presenters. The theme for the night was 'Wines for a sparkling (and red) Christmas', comprising some delicious wines selected carefully by Heather to compliment the different courses of a traditional turkey dinner.



Although a difficult choice, the Crémant du Jura (from a tiny region in France) was voted our favourite sparkling wine of the evening, and the food friendly Urbina Rioja Crianza, which paired well with our turkey, was voted the favourite red.

The Club's 2018 programme has now been finalised and can be viewed on our website at www.bookhamwineclub.org.uk. With presentations from a wide range of speakers, covering 8 countries and spanning a number of wine producing regions, we can expect to taste a diverse selection of wines this year.




Underwood from Aprender planned to go to Lebanon to help a group of willing volunteers and teachers open up a pre-school for Syrian refugees in the Shouf, a mountainous region of the country. Rainbow were approached because we have a well established active learning curriculum. Phil and Rachael explained to us that for the project in Lebanon to be effective, they wanted some film clips to show the trainee teachers how the active learning approach works in practice. Most training films for teachers have been shot in well resourced classrooms, and Aprender wanted to put across a 'this can be done anywhere' message. They needed to be able to show video footage of active learning in action in a very simply equipped classroom. At Rainbow, we use a lot of natural and openended play materials to teach Maths and Science to the children, so we set up a room that could be replicated in places in the world where there are minimal resources to support education. It was exciting being filmed and, as it turned out, the staff were more nervous than the children who just carried on as normal! Rainbow are proud and delighted to be supporting this international project, and Rainbow staff were filmed interacting with children and demonstrating different elements of the daily routine. Using the film clips and the training as their guide, the teachers in Shouf have set up their own active learning classroom using resources from their environment. When we saw photographs of their setting we noticed they have fantastic pine cones and leaves, and even a stream running through their outdoor area! The work in Lebanon will continue and we plan to do more filming with Aprender.

Although the children in Rainbow and the children in Shouf have had very different starts to their lives, it's exciting to know there is a link between our humble village and The Little School of Wells.



It is now official: following the AGM in October, Bookham Decorative and Fine Arts Society will in future be known as The Arts Society Bookham. This is in line with the change in name of the National organization to The Arts Society earlier in the year.

With the new name and Logo, our Society remained as busy as ever with the November meeting anticipating Christmas with a talk by Shirley Smith. She explained, by way of a brilliant selection of paintings, how the portrayal of the Nativity had changed over time, often with no proof these events actually occurred at the birth of the Christ Child - but why let a few facts get in the way of a good story!

The Society's traditional festive lunch on 13th December 2017, proved to be all that was expected. With 123 sitting down to an excelled meal provided by 'Elizabeth



Leatherhead & District Local History Society



Bookham's local Museum re-opens after its annual winter break on Thursday, 5th April 2018, with the traditional official opening on Saturday, 7th April. Based at the 17th century Hampton Cottage in Church Street, Leatherhead, you can discover a wealth of information about the entire district from prehistoric to present day.

The museum is owned and operated by the Leatherhead & District Local Historical Society, which recently launched their brand new website at www.leatherheadhistory.org.

Alongside this comes a new corporate membership scheme, inviting local businesses to benefit from their premises' heritage. The



website's home page has the latest news, whilst both the Society and Museum also have their own separate news pages to cover monthly talks, events, special exhibitions, school craft days, etc. The site is brighter and simpler than before, designed to serve both the local history researchers of the future, and many longstanding supporters. The home page compares what Bookham, Fetcham, Leatherhead, and Ashtead look like today with the same locations from over 100 years ago.

This is just a taste of what is available once you begin delving into the Society's huge archive of material dating back centuries. The area covered also encompasses both Mickleham and Headley. Archives containing seven decades of publications and sound recordings of locals past and present recalling the area as it changed from a largely rural community to the bustling growing residential villages of today.

The new corporate membership scheme offers sponsorship opportunities for local firms in exchange for help in learning about past achievements in their localities and how their customers have become the market they know today. The traditional printed Newsletter and other publications also continue with members getting advance deliveries, among other benefits. Digital versions are also available every quarter.

Spokesman Tony Matthews said: "The Society itself was originally created back on 16th October 1946, when historians used either fountain pens or old fashioned typewriters to report their findings and announce their talks on subjects of local interest. No-one imagined



such a thing as the Internet. Today's new members expect just to click once or twice and learn instantly what is going on now, what happened in the past, and what is coming up."

The Museum will be open between April and mid-December, from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm on Thursday and Fridays, and from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm on Saturdays.
