Garden Developments at Polesden Lacey

In 2018 we received a very generous legacy specifically for use in the grounds at Polesden Lacey. We have the opportunity to develop some of the lost areas of the garden so that we can continue to provide access to beauty and nature for as many people as possible.

We are speaking with lots of charities and local organisations to find out how they use Polesden and what they really cherish, but also what is missing, or what would provide access to these beautiful spaces for new groups of people.

Polesden Lacey has always had a golden thread running through it, being fit to entertain royalty, but also a place for leisure, laughter, and a beautiful setting to bring people together. Anything we do must tie in with the spirit of Polesden – it must be visually stunning, and of the highest quality.

Some of the initial ideas revolve around the Kitchen Garden beyond the thatched bridge.

This 4 acre site supplied Mrs Greville's kitchens at Polesden and in London. The image is from 1947.


The upkeep of the kitchen garden could not be maintained and so a Christmas Tree crop was planted in the 1960's which was replaced with lime and wild cherries in mid 1970's. Below the Kitchen Garden is another 1 acre area with impressive views across the valley where stone viewing platforms once stood. We are also considering perhaps expanding our small Winter Garden by extending planting down towards the Rock Garden and the Upper and Lower Sunken Gardens.

There are many possibilities and options across the garden, but we want community benefit to be central to our planning.

We are keen to hear if you are involved with local groups who would like to input into how developments within the garden may best serve them, or those who are unable to enjoy Polesden in its fullness and how improvements may enable this. From the Chairman DIRECTORS' ANNUAL REPORT TO MEMBERS -2018/19

We have had a quiet year as far as large spending is concerned having spent over £280,000 on major improvements over the last four years. We have also been reviewing expenses and saved £2,000 on our insurance costs.

We had some water entry in the main hall from the roof and this was traced to one of the gable windows. All five gables have been refurbished with new lead and tiles replaced and reset which seems to have dealt with the problem.

We had intermittent loss of lighting at the front of the hall and have replaced the lanterns on the gateposts and over the entrance door and, as a bonus, this also lights up the Old Barn Hall sign.

Hiring Fees – these only went up in line with inflation last year and will do so again for the 2020 year. We have also reviewed our Hiring Agreement for next year in order to make it easier to follow and understand. We introduced our Hallmaster on-line booking system earlier in the year and this is working really well. By clicking on the button on the home page of our website you can check availability in each of the three halls. You can then place a provisional booking which will be confirmed by Roger when in the office.

Supporters – distribution of our Bulletin and collection of our Member's donations depend on over 200 volunteers and we are very grateful to them all for their time and effort. We still do not have an Editor for the Bulletin and would love to hear from anyone who feels that they could help with this.

Community Entertains- at the beginning of this year Lizzie Crawford from Action Theatre Club produced our first Community Entertains for some years. It was an entertaining and inspiring evening with a great variety of acts from all ages. Thanks to all who took part. Village Week – despite some rain this year we had a very successful Village Week .



The Village Day theme was 'All at Sea' and this was interpreted in many different and colourful ways by both our Parade groups and the stalls on the field. The opportunity to highlight plastics and the like in the oceans was taken up by some whilst others featured the colourful creatures to be found. Thank you to all our sponsors and supporters as well as to our Village Day Committee who make it possible.

Many thanks to the Bookham Open Gardens Committee who again put on a tremendous day and to the organisers of the Bridge, the Quiz and the Silver Band night during the Week.

Whilst on thanks I would like to thank all our Management Committee for their work throughout the year and our Manager, Roger, and his assistant, Rob, who do so much for us and our hall users.

Financials – our overall balance at the end of the year shows an increase in reserves of £21,000 which reflects the lower outlay but also the excellent results from fundraising and donations this year.

We have increased the advertising revenue from the Bulletin this year but production costs are still around £5,000 more, covered from Members' donations. Our Hiring charges are close to basic running expenses, but we are dependent on other income to be able to refurbish and improve. Our Hiring charges for 2020 will see a small increase in line with inflation. Affiliation fees will remain at £30 per annum.



Mole Valley District Council Local Plan Timetable Update

The MVDC Local Plan was due for public discussion by early summer but was delayed as there was a change of the political makeup of the Council with the Liberal Democrats taking control. A new date for October was agreed and this too has been put back because an election could occur in the middle of the consultation process. The consultation date is now scheduled for 3rd February to 16th March 2020. Why does this matter? MVDC must be able to demonstrate they have a land supply for five years to build the number of houses each year required by the current plan. This they do not have with just over two years land supply available. The impact means that developers can come forward seeking permission to build and may succeed where previously their claims would have failed.

As with many planning applications approval or non-approval is determined by a variety of planning regulations. Without a five-year land supply Government has told Councils that any balance between approval or rejection should be "tilted" in favour of the developer. This because Government want new housing stock to go ahead rapidly. Just last week the BRA attended an Appeal against a MVDC rejection of building approval when this argument was deployed. We now wait for the Planning Inspector's decision to see the impact of this "tilting" argument. As we anticipate that when the MVDC Local Plan is published a significant percentage of the 2000 or more dwellings that MVDC say will have go on green belt land will be built in Bookham.

There is concern that without a plan, proposals will come forward from developers before this plan is agreed. Because of this we have expressed our disappointment over the delays in publishing the Local Plan through our Councillors.



We are pleased to announce that the actions the school took during the 2018/19 academic year significantly improved attainment and progress across school at both Key Stage1 and KS2. In 2019, 73% of the Year 6 children achieved the expected standard in reading, writing and maths which is a significant improvement on 33% in 2017. We also improved our 'greater depth' on the results seen over the last two years and over half of our Y6 children (53%) achieved the greater depth standard in maths. This is significantly above the national figure. We are very proud of the achievements of our children as there

Rebecca Mole took over after Mrs Rosie Keedy retired. "I don't live in Bookham but everybody has welcomed me into the community. It is so

lovely to feel part of such a nurturing and supportive tribe and that is something I want to carry forward, by continuing events such as the Grandparents Tea party, local school trips to Polesden Lacey and the Toy Museum in Guildford."

"Polesden is a lot smaller than my previous school so getting to know all the pupils and parents has been a lot easier." Rebecca pointed to a board on the wall behind me in her office, where pictures of pupils who have been recognised for exceptional work have been displayed.

Mrs Mole started out as a swimming teacher and horse riding instructor in the 80s before traveling out to Peru to teach in local schools. "Apart from coming into school every day I enjoy being outdoors just as much as the children: open water swimming, walking and running. I completed the London Challenge recently which involved a 2-mile swim, cycling the Prudential ride and completing the London marathon – although not in one go!"

Rebecca took me on a tour of the grounds and a peek into some of the lessons. It was heartwarming to see such enthusiastic staff and pupils interacting together. It was clear to see everyone was having fun whilst learning; it made me want to be back at school!

"We are midway through Science and Technology week, but we also have an Arts week and celebrate Fairtrade Fortnight. We are passionate about using Fairtrade products at school and only stock Fairtrade tea bags and sugar in the staff room."

There is no doubt that the school will grow from strength to strength with such a driven and compassionate person in the headteacher's seat.

We look forward to hearing more from Mrs Mole and the goings-on at Polesden Lacey school as we approach the winter term.

Autumn Adventures - the "Bus Stop Way"



The Bus Stop children and team have been out and about regularly over the past few weeks since the start of term. You can see them walking through the Polesden Lacey estate in their distinctive 'high vis' jackets, pulling their 'survival material' on a trolley or two! The older children are great at encouraging and helping their friends who have only recently started at Bus Stop and they've been building dens and making fires in their fire square in the woods,

enjoy rolling down the South Lawn slope, playing in the adventure playground, and visiting Preserve Copse to discover nature's signs of autumn. In the Bus Stop garden they've been harvesting vegetables from their allotment, creating science experiments, and laying new areas of bark.

They spent an entire day up on Ranmore Common discovering the history behind some of the buildings up there. What is most impressive is that the entire group of about twenty pre-school children and staff all walked back from the Common to their Polesden Lacey base with no complaints or stragglers! Quite a walk for the adults, let alone 2-4 year olds (the very small ones were able to ride in style in the all-terrain pushchair!). The outdoor life at Bus Stop certainly develops the children's resilience and their love of the natural environment.

One of the things that you might not know about us is that we are a centre for training and advising other forest schools in Surrey. As a very early adopter of the Forest School approach the owner of Bus Stop, Kate Rice, is an accredited Forest School Leader and Trainer. As well as training individual practitioners of about two a term Kate visits other Forest School settings (and aspirational Forest School settings) to advise on their suitability and devise a plan of approach with them. Settings all over Surrey have Bus Stop to thank for their Forest School set up and many of the local schools have started their Forest School offerings for their Infant classes with hands-on input and advice from Kate and the **Bus Stop Team!**

When Ofsted came to visit in June they continued to assess the setting as "outstanding". Well done Bus Stop!

Peter Pan Playschool

At the end of the summer term we said goodbye to many of our older children who were ready to make the next step in their learning journey by moving on to school. The returning children have settled back in really well, and we've been joined by many 2, 3 and 4 year olds, and it's already lovely to see new friendships forming and strengthening. At Peter Pan Playschool our ethos is that children learn through play when they feel safe, happy and secure, and our staff team work tirelessly to ensure our environment supports this.

Our weekly theme is based around the children's current interests and experiences – we're currently exploring "The Rainbow Fish" story, and the story supports friendships and sharing which will help to further develop the children's new friendships. We've recently

introduced a cooperative reward system (introduced after a staff member attended the "Henry – Healthy Start, Brighter Future" workshop), where the children and staff give out rewards to acknowledge effort and achievement. When a reward is earned, a bee is placed on the bee hive, and at the end of the session, we all look together to see what a positive day we've had by counting the number of bees. The children will learn empathy and how to recognise and celebrate other's achievements as well as their own, which will really support their emotional development.

Peter Pan Playschool is an inclusive setting, which cares for children from 2 years old until school age. We offer weekday morning sessions 9.10-12.10 during term time, with optional extended



Leatherhead & District Local History Society



FUN HISTORY LECTURES WITH A LOCAL TWIST

Monthly talks to the Leatherhead & District Local History Society returned this autumn after the usual summer break and are now scheduled throughout the coming winter. As usual they are given at the Leatherhead Institute on the third Friday of each month with refreshments served from 7.30pm and speakers getting under way at 8pm. Nonmembers are always welcome for just £2.

Archaeologist Ian Betts of the Museum of London kicked off this season in September with a fun talk on bathing practices in 18th century, focusing on the novelty of public baths at the time and their often questionable reputations.

The first baths in England since Roman times were found in country houses such as at Carshalton and Claremont. Some had a single pool, others both hot and cold. In London,

commercial bagnios, as they were known, were established around Covent Garden, a hotbed of creativity with artists, artists' suppliers, booksellers, bookbinders, printmakers, theatres, actors, writers and a booming sex industry. The bagnios were aimed at the rich, with fine furnishings, highquality tableware and steep prices. They catered for both sexes and upstairs rooms could be rented by the hour or the night.

Hogarth produced a picture of the notorious brothel madam Betty Careless being carried home drunk from her bagnio in a sedan chair. She ended her life in the poor-house but others did very well out of the trade. The Harris List, a periodical of the day listing London's prostitutes, said the bagnios 'provide both sexes with pleasure'. Others promoted a more respectable image, with men and women admitted on different days and some advertised that they could cater for a whole family and their servants.

Spa towns such as Bath, Leamington, Harrogate, Cheltenham and locally Epsom developed separately from the bagnios. They involved drinking health-giving water as well as bathing in it, usually fully clothed. Later, sea bathing also became fashionable with the coming of the railways. Once local authorities began building municipal baths for everyone the bagnios disappeared. The October talk covers The British Hedgerow - Past and Present with Professor Pat Wiltshire outlining how the hedge came to be and how its management influences local landscapes. On 15 November Jane Lewis of Surrey History Centre will speak on Fashion and Folly, describing the bizarre things that people have done to themselves in the interests of fashion.

On Friday, 6 December the annual Christmas Miscellany will include talks on Commander Denniston of Ashtead, wartime code-breaker; recent Test Pitting archaeology at Rowhurst; and a short photo and film programme Walking in Leatherhead shot mainly on the town meadow.



St Lawrence Primary School

Seeking big Ideas from tomorrow's leaders

This term sees the launch of St Lawrence Primary School's philosophy that underpins the education our children will receive. Inspired by the Prince of Wales' 'Harmony' and Grandfather Gandhi 'Be the Change' books, we are taking a fresh look at how we can bring the national curriculum to life through practical experiences for our children.

The motivation behind this shift is to empower our children to use their skills, knowledge and understanding to make positive contributions to others, wildlife and the environment. We will give our children opportunities to share this learning at school, at home, locally, nationally and even globally.

So how will this look? We will learn by enquiries linked to this philosophy. So instead of just studying how water is produced and used, children will take this learning and apply it by conducting a whole school audit of our water use, finding out how we can be using less and helping to look after the environment. We will showcase our learning in a range of ways outside school, conducting inspiring science experiments and embedding real world context into our teaching. This will culminate each term in each class producing a 'Great Work' to share with the school or wider community, giving each child a rewarding sense of achievement and teamwork.

When developing our curriculum we look at every aspect of our children's learning, not just their classroom time. We are proud of the number and diversity of school clubs we provide, many of them free. We will bring in resources and experiences for our children, such as the recent West End in Schools whole school workshop, where each class learnt about a different aspect of the environmental impact we humans have on the earth. This learning was shared with all pupils through dramatic interpretation in a whole school assembly.

We will continue to look for new ways to enrich our children's learning and to share the outcome beyond the classroom. Our goal is to enable this generation to flourish both in school and in the future society that they will lead.

Over the years The Arts Society Bookham has gained a well-deserved reputation for offering members and guests lectures of the highest quality from some of the country's

most knowledgeable experts covering all aspects of the arts.

Chairman Brian Williams reports that what is less well know is the help given to Young Arts within our area. In the past encouragement and financial support for the making of soft sculptures for a school creche, funding and judging a photographic competition by mentally handicapped youngsters and covering the cost of artists visiting schools to show and teach pupils 'new' techniques they can incorporate in their own art work.

This year Bookham joined with our neighbouring Arts Society of Horsley-Lovelace



to fund a session with Adam Aaronson at his glass studio in East Horsley. With 14 young people from the MyTime charity creating their very own unique glass tumbler. MyTime is a small local charity which cares for young carers, some as young as seven, who are the main support for a member of their family who is chronically ill. With Adam Aaronson they were shown how to produce a glass tumbler from a blob of molten glass.

Visits and tours during the summer have included visiting the Longstock Water Gardens in Hampshire and the nearby Bombay Sapphire Gin Distillery. And in August a visit to Michelham Priory, now in the care of Sussex Archaeological Society. In September there was a five day tour of Northern Spain.

David Wright's talk will be full of rich evidence, going back 7,000 years, in the form of paintings, decorated drinking vessels, buildings and literature.
