



Friends of Bookham Commons

Bookham Commons Centenary Year

Surrey, and notably Bookham, residents have long been at the forefront of supporting the local countryside. This year marks one hundred years since the Bookham Commons were gifted to the community. In 1922 Little Bookham Common was acquired, along with Eastwick Park by a property developer, when they were sold-off. Concerned local residents raised the funds (no mean feat just after the First World War) to rescue and protect this wonderful ancient landscape on their doorstep. Little Bookham Common and Banks Common were both generously given to the National Trust to manage in 1923, which is why they are now known as Bookham Commons.

This followed other visionary local supporters who had already safeguarded Hindhead Commons and Box Hill even earlier.

It is most fitting that this year the work of the longest standing ranger on the commons has been recognised in the Queen's New Year Honours list. Ian Swinney has been awarded the British Empire Medal for services to conservation and heritage in Surrey. Next January will be his 45th anniversary as ranger on the commons, and this December will mark his 50 years of service for the National Trust. Ian was due to retire in 2022, but is continuing to work on a part time basis whilst managing his hand-over to Sam Valente, the new ranger, who is moving across from working at Polesden Lacy.

lan and Sam are continuing the work on the commons, in line with the Countryside Stewardship and Woodland Management Plan tasks, agreed with Natural England and the Forestry Commission. There have been many tributes paid to lan for his award, and he always includes a shout out for his regular volunteers, who do so much, turning out every week in all weathers.

The Friends of Bookham Commons continue to raise money for future projects on the commons, which otherwise would not get funded. This year we are planning to enhance the wetland scrapes at Banks Common and provide a bird hide overlooking them... watch this space!

Polesden Lacey Infant School



This is a wonderful time of year at Polesden Lacey Infant School, the short days of winter are behind us and more and more things are springing into life.

As an Eco School, we are passionate about the environment, we want to make sure we are providing habitats that support local wildlife and to develop the children's understanding of how they can look after the natural world.

We have been very fortunate to receive more sapling trees that the children have planted to provide additional habitats for the insects, birds and animals living in our local area. We have also planted bulbs and seeds for insect friendly plants, to create more areas for wildlife and teach the children about how plants grow

and the role they play in increasing biodiversity.

We know that it will be a while before we see the fruits of our labour, but we will have the excitement of watching them grow and knowing that, in time, they will provide homes and food for our wildlife as well as making our lovely school even more beautiful and welcoming.

One of the ways that we get to appreciate our school grounds is during our weekly Forest School sessions. Each week, every class has one afternoon in the wood and orchard. They are expertly led by our fully trained Forest School practitioner who plans a wonderful variety of opportunities for the children.

Some of their activities are linked to learning that the children are experiencing in the classroom. Some are inspired by seasonal or cultural events and many are based purely on exploring the amazing environment we are lucky enough to have within the school grounds. No matter the weather, we put on our waterproofs, pull on our wellies and head into the woods for some fun!

At the end of October, we received the good



news that our application to be a Fairachiever Fairtrade School had been approved. We celebrated with some yummy Fairtrade chocolate!



The Friends of All Saints Little Bookham Church and St. Lawrence Effingham Church

We are a secular organisation set up to support the maintenance of the fabric of the two historic churches in the Parish of Effingham with Little Bookham. Both buildings are key elements of our community's heritage.

St Lawrence Church, Effingham was probably built between 1086 and 1100. The churchyard is where Barnes Wallis, the designer of the bouncing bomb used on the dambuster raid during the Second World War, lies at rest. Sadly, the last surviving member of that mission has recently passed away.

All Saints Church may have originally been built around 1100. The church contains probably the finest collection of hatchments in Surrey, displaying the armorial bearings of the past Lords of the Manor. A hatchment was hung outside the residence of the Lord of the Manor on death and subsequently hung in the church. Even older is the adjacent yew tree which has been dated at 1,300 years old!

Both churches are normally open during the day and are well worth a visit. A history of both churches can be found via this link: https://www.effinghamwithlittlebookhampari sh.org.uk/history/

The Grange

2023 marks the 85th Anniversary of our charity. Our founder Miss Julia Sweet is said to have visited Great Bookham from her home in Leicestershire for a wedding and, upon walking down Rectory Lane, espied our now home which she felt was ideal for her School of Stitchery and Lace; she was not wrong! In due course the name changed to The Grange at Bookham.

After four and a half years of heading up our organisation, Eloise Appleby, has stepped down from her role as Chief Executive Officer due to ill health. Our Board of Trustees have appointed Hugh Skeil, former Head of Finance and Transformation, as Acting Chief Executive Officer, until a new person is appointed.

In the meantime The Grange continues with its good work, skill sessions and activities for The People We Support. Over Christmas, we baked and sold over 90 Christmas cakes and made nearly as many Christmas wreathes. We held our Carol Concert plus the countless Christmas Lunches, parties and pantomimes that we provided or attended. Of particular note was our Alice in Wonderland Art Installation. Our

Creative Arts team transformed our grounds into a true Wonderland, and wonder we did in awe, as the storybook characters came to life in the form of spectacular costumes fashioned from recycled fabrics sewn by our people and worn by them too. Our procession paraded its way around the site to the rose garden, where visitors could make their wishes of hope for the New Year; in the late evening, with the additional lighting, it looked especially magical. The project took around six months to complete involving all areas of the Grange and, having been awarded the status of Plastic Free's first Business Champion in Bookham, it was a 'green' art project where we repurposed everyday objects into new artefacts.

NATURE'S CALENDAR: IN THE NEW YEAR

Battling Robins

Ah the robin: that beautiful cute cuddly little bird seen in peaceful Christmas card scenes and the Netflix animation Robin Robin. But all isn't quite what it seems...

Robins are actually tough as nails with fire in their belly as well as on their chest. A good feeding patch is well worth defending, and that is exactly what they are doing when you hear them singing in mid-winter or see them chasing off anything that might have an eye on their worms.

Wee Wrens

Another of our smallest birds, the wren, is easier to spot at this time of year as they'll be

out frantically searching for insects to eat. The lack of insects and their small size makes them particularly vulnerable to cold weather, and in the most severe winters populations can dramatically decline.

Their scientific name is Troglodytidae which means 'cave dweller'. This reflects their habits of nesting and searching for food in gaps and crevices. Many defend territories where they know there will be a good supply of food but the differences are often put aside on an evening when they come together to roost to keep warm.

Put up your Christmas nest boxes!

Frisky Foxes

It may be the middle of winter but foxes are turning up the heat. January is the peak of their breeding season when they're at their most vocal, with their screeches and screams echoing through the blackness. They don't really mean any harm, they are just looking for love or fighting off rivals.

Once couples pair up they spend a few weeks patrolling their territory and hunting together, forming a strong bond. The female also seeks out a place to give birth to her pups once spring arrives. These could be in purpose-built dens or equally underneath your garden shed!




Mole Valley Indoor Bowling Club
