

9 | Sandra Holland: 4 Forge Cottages, Church Road, KT23 3JY

NEW: A small, secluded garden, planted for colour, mainly with shades of purple, blue, pink and white, in pots and borders. Unusual, upcycled and refurbished artefacts are used in a creative and imaginative way.



10 | Mary and Brian Cann: Oak Lodge, 9 Mill Close, KT23 3JX

A half-acre garden with many interesting plants, trained wall shrubs, fruit and other climbers. Greenhouse courtyard area with trained peach and cherry trees and informal flower beds. Potting shed with space-saving column water butts and a secluded outdoor potting bench area. Fruit and vegetable beds integrate with flower borders in the front garden.



11 | Barbara and Max Hicks: 75 Eastwick Park Avenue, KT23 3NH

NEW: A delightful and well-designed family garden with many interesting features. A curving path invites you into the garden to find an intriguing "tree house platform" in the apple tree, a paved seating area with a raised bed, and a wide range of plants chosen with a skilled use of colour.

12 | Cally Harris: 6 Keswick Road, KT22 9HH

NEW: Recently restored and redesigned, while maintaining some original features, this garden uses gabions to divide a sloping garden into different levels. There are many different shrubs, trees and flowering plants, and a well-stocked conservatory houses tender plants, while a secluded area provides seating beside a small pond.



13 | Anne and Peter Grabaskey: Hazelmead, (opposite 1), Hazel Way, KT22 9QD

NEW: A plant lover's garden with unusual and interesting flowers, trees, shrubs, a pergola, and colourful pots. A well-stocked greenhouse and pond are features, and chickens provide fertilizer as well as eggs.

14 | Caroline Cardew Smith and Martin Farrell: 8 The Drive, KT22 9EN

NEW: A large, organically maintained garden which encourages pollinators and wildlife. There are wild grassy areas, trees and shrubs, colourful borders and a large pond, in addition to a productive fruit and vegetable garden.

Parking for disabled visitors in The Drive. Otherwise park in Lower Road or Cobham Road (from which access via a short alleyway between 61A and 63A).



15 | Steve and Janice Urry: 1 Lower Road, KT22 9EL

NEW: An extensive, mature garden packed with trees, shrubs and flower beds as well as a large fish pond with waterfall, rose pergola and raised vegetable plots. There are interesting and unexpected areas to explore and younger visitors will enjoy the play area.

Parking in drive or Lower Road.

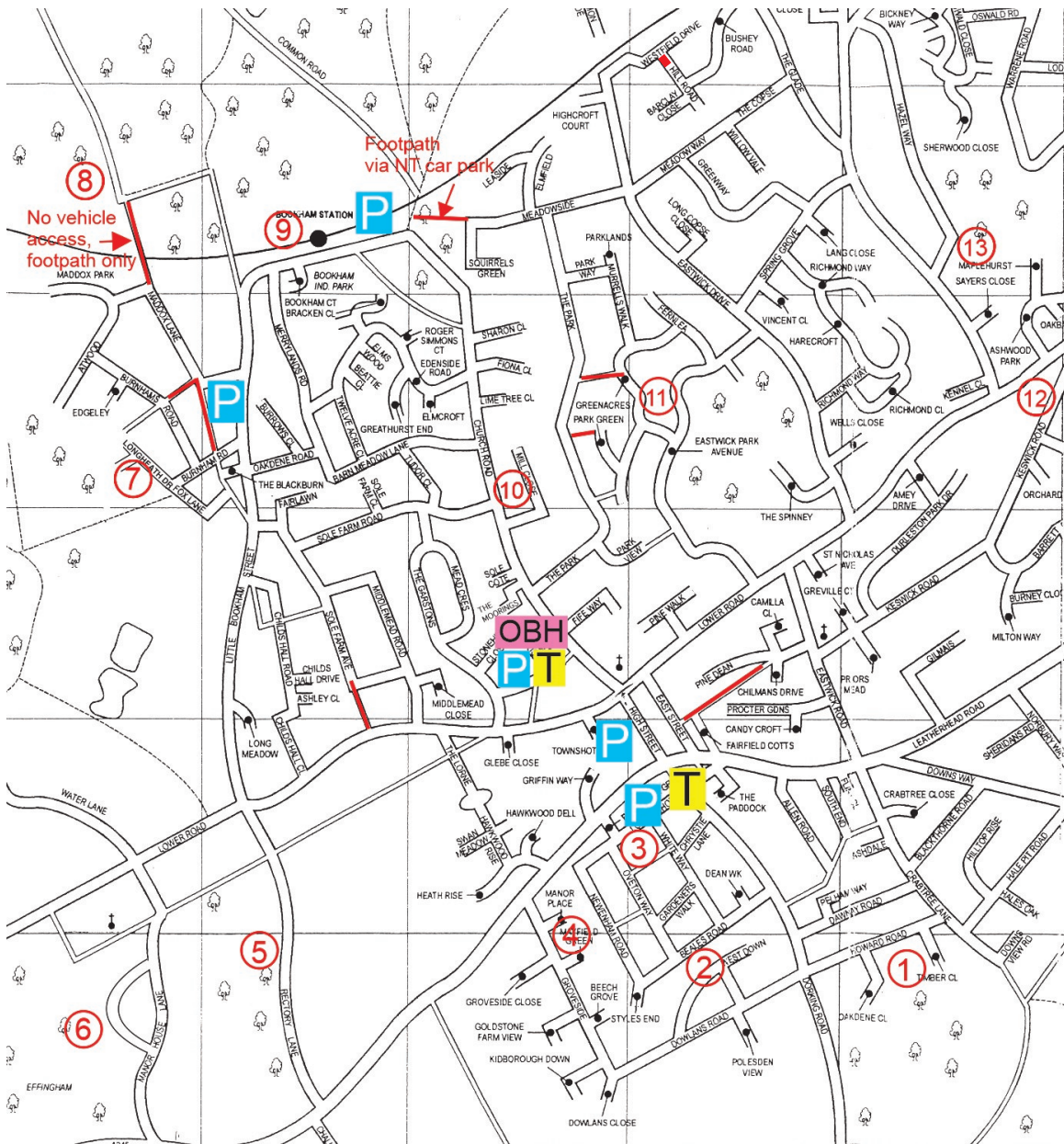

- 1 | Polesden Lacey Infant School: Closes at 4.00pm.**
Oakdene Close, KT23 4PT
 Raised vegetable plots, mini orchard, a sensory garden, woodland area, bug hotel, wild flower area and a pond provide learning experiences and enhance the school environment.
- 2 | Fiona Goldsmith: 37A Beales Road, KT23 4NA**
NEW: Recently refurbished terraced garden with path and steps leading up to summerhouse. Mainly shrubs, perennials and climbers with infill annuals and trials of integrating vegetables and fruit on a small scale. Varied areas of the garden with an interesting paved feature and "egg" water feature.
- 3 | Jan and John Edgcumbe: 11 Lower Shott, KT23 4LR**
NEW: A newly designed and planted garden in a contemporary style. It is immediately accessible from the house with young trees and climbers on either side. The further borders have prairie-like perennials and grasses. There are seats to relax in and garden art to enjoy.
- 4 | Carol & Nick Teunon: Ridge House, 11 Groveside, KT23 4LD**
NEW: Sloping garden on chalk with a focus on cottage plants and roses. Also contains grasses and ferns for year-round interest. Back garden includes a large blue cedar and a raised patio area with a number of pots with summer bedding, cannas, pelargoniums and dahlias.
- 5 | The Grange Centre: Closes at 4.00 pm. Rectory Lane, KT23 4DZ**
 A restored Victorian walled garden with flowers, fruit and vegetables, cared for by the horticultural team. Mini allotment plots give scope for individual creativity, and a bug hotel encourages pollinating insects. Please tread carefully on grassy areas, where bee orchids may be found.

- 6 | Manor House School: Closes at 4.00 pm. Manor House Lane, KT23 4EN**
 A chance to explore the beautiful and extensive school grounds. There are many different habitats, including an orchard, rose bed, herbaceous borders and wild meadows, in addition to a formal striped lawn leading to the house. An idyllic setting which encourages wildlife and offers picturesque views.
Parking on site.
- 7 | Brenda Kent: 2 Heathside, Longheath Drive, KT23 3AX**
 Colourful and tranquil garden with mature trees, shrubs, beds of mixed planting and roses. A small white garden adds to the interest. Several seating areas offer different views of the garden and pots filled with annuals add colour to the terrace.
Parking only at Maddox Park corner car park.
- 8 | Little Bookham Allotments: Maddox Lane, KT23 3HT**
 Discover one of Bookham's best kept secrets nestled on the edge of Bookham Common. Visitors will find not only allotments to explore but also a wildflower meadow and an abundance of flowers to enjoy. **Some plants for sale. Parking on site.**
