




We require £42K to fund the project and are delighted to say we have already raised £22.5K. We would like to pass on our huge thanks to the Thomas Flack Fund (£10K) and



Polesden Lacey Infant School



It has been a long winter but as I write this article, in early April, Spring and Summer seem to be fast approaching. Being nestled amongst rolling fields and the beautiful woodlands that surround Polesden Lacey Infant School, we are frequently reminded of the seasons and how nature has to be resilient and take whatever comes its way.

Last summer we saw the grass bound back to be green and vibrant following the long hot months with no rain. This winter we have seen crocuses push through the snow, shallots planted in the autumn are now bursting through in the allotment and the buds are opening on the new fruit trees in the orchard, hopefully getting ready to bear plums and pears for the first time later this year.

Our children also benefit from this amazing environment. Not only do they experience first-hand the wonder of our planet and the importance of looking after it but they can also draw upon the courage and resilience of the flora and fauna. These are values that we believe are so important for all of us in our school community, along with being fair, respectful, curious and caring. Using these values, we like to challenge our children and 'stretch their brains', helping them to develop their 'Growth Mind Set'.

The pupils talk of the power of 'YET' and explain they may not be able to do something at the moment but with belief in themselves and hard work they will overcome the challenges that they encounter. The teachers are skilled at setting challenges that are not too easy or too difficult but are just hard enough for their pupils to eventually succeed.



It is a privilege to see children puzzle, struggle and be triumphant, the smiles and squeals of delight make being in a school like Polesden Lacey Infant School such a joy. It is something that our parents also recognize. In our recent successful OFSTED report a parent was quoted saying: "Polesden Lacey Infants is a magical place that gives our children wings to become enthusiastic, resilient and independent learners.'

Rainbow Pre School



At the beginning of the spring term we welcomed a few new starters into Rainbow and it has been

lovely to see how well they have settled into the rhythm of our pre-school. They have been enjoying a variety of fun activities/themes this term such as Pancake Day (where they made pretend pancakes/cakes with our vanilla scented playdough), emergency services and emergency service vehicles and Easter.

We have managed to get over to the library garden (between the downpours) for lots of



outdoor games and activities, including one of our outdoor Easter egg hunts. They had a smaller Easter egg, rabbit and chick hunt in our 'feely tray' to see how many of each they could find. The children also enjoy using Great Bookham School playground several times a week, where another of our colour and number Easter egg hunts went on.

The children have been busy planting seeds and watering the spring bulbs, which they planted in the autumn in our Rainbow garden. They will be adding more plants such as strawberry/tomato plants and edible herbs for them to water and care for in the warmer months ahead.

We are in the process of arranging a mobile farm visit. We aim to do this each year as the children really benefit from the hands on experience and learning about what care the farm animals need. They have the opportunity should they wish, to touch or hold the smaller animals like chickens, rabbits and lambs. We make a photo storybook of the children and



animals together with written quotes from the children. This goes in our Rainbow library for the children to recall and talk about.

As the warmer weather approaches, we will be taking the children down to Bookham common to observe the changes that happen in spring, visit the nearby ponds and have a play in the woodland climbing area.

Bookham and Fetcham Gardeners' Association

WILDLIFE IN GARDENS (and the Eastwick Allotment shop)

As someone who enjoys both my garden and an allotment, I am well aware of how both help support wildlife in urban areas. Allotments generally form some of the best habitat mosaics and wildlife corridors with some linking up with parks, tracks, hedgerows, churchyards and rivers.

These days we try to reduce or eliminate the use of chemicals wherever possible and use companion planting and physical barriers to combat pests such as aphids, slugs and sawfly. In your garden try to create habitats for wildlife. For example, bee boxes, hedgehog

houses, log and stone piles for invertebrates like toads and slow worms who will also inhabit a compost heap, and we see many of them on the allotments.

Manage hedges to give birds nesting opportunities in a safe environment, and when space allows set aside unmown grassy areas to nurture insects and amphibians. Patches of nettles will provide both plant foods and breeding areas for butterflies. By planting late, mid-season and early blooming nectar rich flowers you will attract pollinators and beneficial insects all year round. In the garden, make a pond. Keep it ice free in winter by floating a ball on the top but of course

make sure it is safe for children.

Feed birds throughout winter and wherever possible supply nesting boxes. At the shop on Eastwick Allotments we also sell bird food at a very good price to our members and of course membership is open to all gardeners – not just plot holders. It's just £5 to join and you'll certainly recoup the cost in a season many times over if you buy most of your gardening needs there. Come along any Sunday morning between 10am and midday when the shop is open. We are on the allotments and the entrance is at the bottom of Keswick Road near the junction with Eastwick Road.

Bookham Bowling Club

90th ANNIVERSARY

The Bookham Bowling Club was formed on 16th October 1933 under the auspices of W.W. Leavis of Groveside, Great Bookham, then chairman of Leatherhead Urban District Council.

Alfred Longhurst a landscape gardener was contracted to construct a bowling green on the Chrystie Recreation Ground. The work cost £200 and the contract is still in the club files.

The pavilion, now used for storage, was given to the club by Herbert Allen who owned the land where Allen Road now stands.

The Ladies section was formed in 1935. It was known as The Bookhams BC until 1938.

The club flourished and the members maintained the Bowling Green until 1938 when the Council agreed to maintain the green and the premises were leased to the



Club on favourable terms. After the Second World War the green deteriorated and in the early 1970s the Club members assisted the Council groundsman to improve the green.

In 1975 the club accepted full responsibility for the maintenance from the Council and have done so ever since..

In 1971 the old pavilion was too small for the membership of 90 and the Council agreed to provide a new building complete with furniture and fittings. The Club undertook the internal decorations and the new Club House

was opened in 1972 by Stan Taylor the Chairman of the Council. In 1983 toilets were added and a bar was added in 1994 thanks to a grant from the Foundation for Arts & Sports.

So here we are in 2023 with a membership of 120 and social members of 50. The Club is more than a bowls club putting on events throughout the year, Disability and Charity events, Short Mat bowls, Quiz nights, Bingo & Whist/Bridge nights alongside the Internal & External Club bowls events.

There are special events planned for this our 90th Anniversary.



Leatherhead Museum



All six of Jane Austen's classic Regency period novels are set in southern England and while she is mostly associated with Hampshire, Bath and points west of here, she personally stayed in Bookham, mentions Boxhill by name, and is thought to have based her novel Emma in Leatherhead, while renaming it "Highbury".

As she lived from 1775 to 1817, she is very likely to have passed the same Hampton Cottage which now houses the Leatherhead Museum in Church Street. No wonder then that the brand new exhibition opened there from April this year is Jane Austen's Leatherhead, and the museum's new Curator, Cathy Brett, and her team are aiming to add the area to the international trail of locations followed by Austen enthusiasts from across the world.

The exhibition in the museum's Hollis Room includes period costumes made and worn by The LiterARTY Collective in 'A Regency Happening' an event staged during last year's Mole Valley Heritage Week. The show also features artworks, photographs, videos, maps, illustrations and artefacts from the museum's archives.

Cathy's research along with fellow artist Lucy Quinnell has produced evidence to support Leatherhead as the real life Highbury and visitors to the exhibition are encouraged to contribute their own thoughts on actual local people and places that may have inspired the novelist more than 200 years ago. A series of linked outreach projects include 'Walking in Jane Austen's Footsteps', a guided walk around locations that may have inspired 'Emma'.

The Hollis Room is just one of six newly transformed rooms presenting the rich heritage of the Leatherhead district. Cathy says: "We are custodians of a wonderful collection, gathered by our predecessors, and we must share this valuable resource with the town. The museum is the interface between collection and community. Through our displays of artefacts, themed exhibits and events, we are taking the 'Story of Leatherhead' to the whole community."

It's a fantastic opportunity to meet the artists and ask questions, buy direct from the artists, or take part in a workshop to learn a new skill. There will be something for everyone!



MAY DAWN CHORUS

Many forms of wildlife watching involve a degree of discomfort – Arctic cold, tropical humidity, windswept headlands or small boats in choppy seas. At this season, however, we can enjoy one of the world's best wildlife experiences while still in bed, without even the effort of opening our eyelids.

Even in cities, but certainly in our area rich in mature gardens with shrubs and trees, the dawn chorus reaches its peak in May. Lie back and enjoy the outpouring of music from many different species as the curtains slowly brighten with the increasing light.

As the breeding season hots up, male birdsong reaches its zenith because the territory for food-gathering must be protected. For many species, strong musical performance also offers the opportunity for liaisons with willing females

Almost all birds sing as the day gets light. This proclaims "I've survived the night and this is

still my patch." It also makes good use of the time between waking and having enough light and warmth for insects to take wing and the serious business of food gathering for a hungry brood to start.

It is worth getting up in the dark (around 4 am) at least once in May to enjoy the full benefit of the experience outdoors. Wear a fleece, take a plastic bag and a cushion to sit on, settle quietly and wait.

The tawny owl hoots as it retires to its daytime roost in a large tree after a night of hunting. Not long after, a robin begins to sing. Then every robin competes. Blackbirds soon join in with their melodies. Robins and blackbirds have large pupils and so see more at dawn and dusk than most garden birds.

Chaffinches pigeons and doves are heard next. Then the others join the chorus in rapid succession. The dawn chorus is an experience not a tutorial, so don't expect to learn to identify birdsong during the dawn chorus.
